Activity Suggestions! Make it your Day!

- # Create an "I can" chart - talk about what the children can do. Have each child say something that they know how to do. List what each child says on a chart. Example: I can ride a bike (Sally). I can set the table (Joey). I can do a somersault (Ashley).
- # Me Flag - On a cut flag shape, children cut out pictures of their favourite foods, animals, toys etc., Glue on to a banner.
- # Self-Portrait Banner - Give each child a piece of paper and have them draw or paint a self portrait. When all the pictures are done, use yarn or ribbon to tie each picture onto a banner to display in your room.

- # Fingerprints - Explain that no two people have the same fingerprints. Help each child to use an ink pad to make fingerprints on a white sheet of construction paper. Line up everyone's finger prints on a table or hang on the wall. Have children use a magnifying glass to observe the fingerprints and look for similarities and differences.
- # Growth Chart
- # Eye Colour Graphing - Have a bar chart with each eye colour (Brown, Blue, Green, Hazel) on top. Pass around a mirror and have each child say what eye colour they have. They can then put their picture under the correct colour. Talk about how each eye colour is special, but discover what the most common eye colour among them is.

- # Explore with Magnifying Glasses - Provide magnifying glasses and encourage the children to use the magnifying glasses to look at their fingerprints, skin, hair, etc.
- # Ask children to bring in a picture of their family and let them take turns telling about their family members during circle or group time. Use the pictures to create a class bulletin board about families.
- # Life Sized Me- Trace children's bodies on large pieces of paper from a paper roll.
- # Provide them with supplies to decorate their bodies and add clothing details.
- # Add a lot of dress up items and mirrors to home corner for dramatic play.
